Writing Your Family History at January 4 Meeting

Easily create and publish family keepsake books, by using templates from Heritage Makers will be the program topic for the January 4th meeting of the Dane County Area Genealogical Society.

Heritage Makers offers a number of choices for publishing interesting books about your Roots or your family members. The My family tree/Roots templates allow you to add family photo's, birth and death dates, and short write ups

about yourself and your ancestors going back three generations. The final page of the book features a family tree with the individuals who are included in the book.

The Grandparent Story book guides you thru writing about the life of your family member. Suggestions for topics help you focus on subjects that you might like to include.

You can insert photos to illustrate your story. You

also have the choice of backgrounds, patterns, colors and can customize your layout. The basic book is 26 pages, but this can be expanded up to 78 pages.

Some of the other products offered, are creating photo journals and personalized calendars.

Google Tutorial

Google – features and tips for Genealogists to get the most from using Google's many features, was the topic for the program that Pat Skubis presented on December 7, 2006. She covered tips and rules that will aid you in decreasing the time you spend when searching.

Some of these rules to modify your search are:

 Use quotation marks around any two words or a phrase to find results where the words appear together exactly as you have entered them. (e.g., "genealogy classes")

- Narrow the search by adding file extension modifiers .DOC, .PDF, . C O M , (e.g., genealogy.COM).
- Add + (plus) sign before the words that are absolutely critical to your search. This tells Google to look for pages that display this information. (e.g., red rose). Google ignores common words and characters such as "where" and "how", as well as certain single digits and single letters, because they tend to slow down your search without improving the results. Google will indicate if a common word has been excluded by displaying details on the results page below the search box.
- Use OR or or to find search results that match any one of a number of words. Google's default operation is to return results that match all search terms, so by linking your terms with or you can find more specific results. * Note using the small or, it brings up the least number of results. This works well when searching common surnames.
- Combining modifiers (called operators by Google) can also

decrease the searching time. (e.g., "Sam Smith" WI genealogy or cemetery) brought up only 90 results.

Have you found a favorite site and you'd like to see related topic? Then click on the similar pages link. Did your site come up in a different language? Then let Google translate it for you.

One of the best tips is using Google to help you search within a site for a surname or topic. For example: Type what you want to search for on which Web site (e.g., military site: www.familytreemagazine.c om pulls up 160 + pages on the Family Tree Magazine site.) This trick is very helpful for quickly finding surnames on genealogy sites that don't have indexes or search capabilities.

Pat also covered using the "I'm Feeling Lucky" button and how to save photos to your hard drive. She explained that when you receive the Error Message 404 – you can sometimes bring sites back from the dead by clicking on the Cache link. Cache is the snapshot that Google took of the page as they crawled the web. The page may have changed since that time. This cached page may reference images that are no longer available.

Some of the New features Google has added are Google video, Google toolbar and Google Earth. Google Earth is a neat tool that lets you preview a trip to any part of the earth.

Are you planning a research trip to a different city? If so you will find Google Maps will help you locate local genealogy resource facilities in the towns you wish to visit. It will link you to their web sites so that you can check out when and on which days they are open and you can map your way from on building to the

Google can also help you shop for the latest genealogy items, just try Google's Froogle. Through Google you can find groups with similar interests to do specialized join, searches and try out new products.

Google also offers Picasa, which is a photo editing program that you can download free. With Picasa, you can organize your photos, fix and crop them, email or share them with friends. If you really want to be creative it even helps you create collages, movies and screen savers.
