Genealogical Resources at the Wisconsin Veterans Museum at September 4 meeting

Russ Horton of the Wisconsin Veterans Museum (WVM) will be discussing the genealogical resources at the WVM and opportunities to help make its resources more accessible to others at the September 4 DCAGS meeting.

Horton, an Oshkosh native, received his bachelor's degree in history from UW-Madison and a dual master's degree in history and library science from UW-Milwaukee. He currently works as the Reference Archivist at the WVM in Madison.

The WVM is an educational activity of the Wisconsin Department of Veterans Affairs and seeks to recognize and affirm the role of state veterans in America's military past.

Horton has been at the WVM for seven years and in that time has organized letters and photographs from the Civil War to the present conflict, helped genealogists discover their ancestors' military service records, aided researchers writing books on Wisconsin regiments or other military

topics, performed oral history interviews with veterans, and cataloged the occasional WWI sea mine or WWII fragmentation grenade.

What's New at the Family History Centers? In Person & Online

Pam Anderson led on a tour of what's new at the Family History Centers at the August 7 DCAGS meeting.

The first stop was
HeritageQuest. This program
allows searches for Census,
Books, PERSI, Revolutionary
War Era Pension & BountyLand Warrant Application
files, Freedman's Bank. The
new addition is the U.S. Serial
Set, which has Memorials,
Petitions and Private Relief
Actions in the U.S. Congress.

The second stop was Genlines. This program can be accessed on the HP computer desktop at the Family History library. The computer is on the right side where two computers are against the wall. Genlines is a

Swedish program that includes church and archive records from the 16th-20th century. There are 16 million images of church records. These records consist of birth/baptismal, confirmation, marriage, death/burial, church ledgers and household examination rolls. In some cases these church records are complemented with those kept by a government agency known as Statistics Sweden (abbreviated as SCB).

Pam said you can search by county or parish. Genline allows you to go page-by page, but Pam thought it was not a simple process of going next page or back a page. Pam found the program often timed out and was not able to get the Familyfinder program to work at all. Printing can also be a problem because of the size of the files.

Records archive is available by subscription, and may be found at www.genline.com. You can download Genline FamilyFinder for free. However, to have full access to the Swedish Church Records archive, you must purchase a subscription. To read a review of the program, go to http://www.genline.com/res ources/articles 1.php. What's New at the Family History Centers continued

The next item on the tour was the Godfrey Memorial Library. It has a nice search engine, but Pam said much of the information on that site is now also on World Vital Records.

World Vital Records, has a nice search engine that weeds out nongenealogical information, Pam said. Later this site will have the Brenner Collection from the Mittelfranken area of Bavaria. The collection has Ahnentafels of families from the area as well as marriage records of soldiers from the area in the 18th and 19th centuries. This will include an index as well as the actual records containing over 3.5 million names from 1650-1875.

The next program on Pam's tour was Footnote. Pam said it has an interesting search engine where you can continue to add more categories to reduce the number of hits. It has Revolutionary War records, FBI files, naturalization records index, especially New York state, U.S. passport applications and Civil War records, especially Confederate information.

The general www.FamilySearch.org website has research guides, guidance of what records to use to find a birth, death, marriage during different time periods in different counties, word lists, databases to search and the Family History Library catalog.

The last place on the tour was Search Labs at http://search.labs.familysearch.org/re cordsearch/start.html. You can also get to the site from a link on the www.familysearch.org. Look at the second listing under "What's New." It talks about this as a prototype for searching millions of new records. It has U.S. Censuses 1850, 1860, 1870, 1900 with images, 1880 no images. The 1841 and 1861 England and Wales censuses. Other censuses include the 1930 Mexico, 1895 Argentina, 1855 and 1865 Massachusetts state, 1855, 1875, 1885, 1895 and 1905 Wisconsin state, and the 1885, 1935 and 1945 Florida state. There are also vital records with images, Georgia death; Michigan - birth, death and

marriage; Ohio – death; Philadelphia – death; Texas – death and Utah – death. Vital records without images: Philadelphia – Marriage index; Texas – death index; Utah – death index; Washington – death index; West Virginia – birth, death and marriage and Ontario, Canada – death.

Other records: Civil War pension index, WWII draft registration card images for older men), Freedman Bank Records & Virginia Freedman's Bureau Virginia marriages, Cecil Co, Maryland Probate images, funeral records from Virginia.

Church records with images: Diocese of Belleville, IL, one Diocese from France, two from Spain, one from Czech Republic and Cheshire, Eng. and the Bishops Transcripts from Diocese Durham, Eng. There are also civil transcripts of Parish registers in Posen and Brandenburg, Germany. There are search engines for baptism, marriage, burials for Mexico and Norway, 1700-1900 and for baptism and marriage for England and Germany 1700-1900.

So, visit the Family History Center and take Pam's tour.

Pam Anderson's presentation on the new databases that are available at the Family History Center and the new online resources available on the FamilySearch site prompted me to go home and check out the new features. Thanks Pam for an enjoyable program.

I would like to make all of you aware of two articles that were in the August 2008 issue of the FGS Delegate Digest. The first is about the online records from Georgia.

Georgia's 1919-27 Death Records Indexed Online

The State of Georgia has made over 275,000 death certificates accessible online at no cost. Researchers will no longer have to request by mail or personally visit the state archives to obtain certificates for deaths that occurred between 1919 and 1927. Each name in the searchable online index is linked

death certificate. The extracted information is printed below the digital image. The certificates include age, county of death, parents' names, occupation, gender, race and cause of death. To search the index and view certificates, go to http://www.GeorgiaArchives.org. Under the "most popular" column. click "death certificates." The death certificate database is part of the Georgia Archives "Virtual Vault." This contains a treasure trove of important Georgia records such as colonial will books (1754-79), colonial wills (1733-78), headright and bounty plats of surveys (1783-1909), Chatham County deed books (1785-98), Confederate enlistment oaths and discharges (1861-64) and Confederate pension applications (1879-1960). No printed extractions are available for these records.

Cook County (Illinois) Birth, Marriage, and Death Records

The second FGS Delegate Digest article is about the online vital records from Cook County. These are not free, but you are able to search the database for free and gain some information. You can search using just surname or with both surname and first name. You can also search marriage records using the wife's maiden name. The only feature that I did not like is that it did not give both the groom's name and the wife's maiden name together. You can order the records for \$15 each.

Jan Meisels Allen, Chairperson of the Public Records Access Monitoring Committee and a Director-at-Large of the International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies, has recently spoken with both a supervisor and the senior public information officer of the Cook County Vital Records Department

regarding the progress of their posting the birth, marriage, and death records on their website

(http://www.cookcountygenealogy.co m/FAQ.aspx)as not everything is yet posted. Here is a summary of what Jan has learned: Not all records are yet posted and it will take upwards of six months for the records to be complete. They are waiting for an outside indexing firm to provide them with the indexing to be posted. Birth records (75 years old and older): There are no birth records yet available indexed on the website prior to 1916. That means that 1916-1933 records should be available. Marriage records (50 years and older): Some are hand-indexed and there are intermittent years available: 1930-1937, 1940, 1945, 1948, 1949, 1950-1958. They are uploading 1930-1940

marriages. Death records (20 years and older): 1915-1946, 1949-1957, 1960-1988 should be available. As it is sporadic and it is being updated in "bits and pieces" there might be some other records in the years mentioned above that are also not yet posted. Just keep trying as they post the updated index frequently. Since this opened in early July they have had 6000 people register accounts representing 1/2 million pages. The international response they have been receiving from China to Croatia shows what an international passion genealogy is and Jan complemented [sic] the officer that Cook County has taken such a lead to make the vital records accessible to all. Jan has asked to be kept apprised of updates on the website and will report again as needed.

SITE TO BEHOLD

MISSOURI STATE ARCHIVES: Missouri Birth & Death Records Database, Pre-1910

The Missouri Birth and Death Records Database is an abstract of the birth, stillbirth, and death records recorded before 1909 and that are available on microfilm at the Missouri State Archives.

The <u>Bureau of Vital Records</u> has certificates of Missouri births from 1910 to the present. The Bureau also maintains certificates of Missouri deaths that are less than fifty years old. Death records over fifty years old are available at the Missouri State Archives. (Search <u>Missouri Death Certificate</u>)

The database currently contains over 185,000 records from 87 counties. Information found in this database includes:

Births and Stillbirths: name of child, date and place of birth, sex, and race; nationality, residence, and ages of parents, occupation and full name of father, maiden name of mother, name and address of medical or other attendant making return; in case of stillbirth, name of undertaker and place of burial.

Deaths: date of report, name, sex, color, age, occupation, marital status, nationality, birthplace; date, place, and cause of death; date and place of burial, addresses of undertaker, physician returning certificate.
