## A Presentation of the RootsMagic Genealogical Software at March 6 Meeting

In March Sherry Lloyd will provide a tour of the computer software program RootsMagic. RootsMagic software has been in use for many years under different titles. It is one of the easiest software programs to use but one of the most powerful programs available.

The March program will demonstrate some of the features of the software including the basics for recording genealogy information, printing reports, wall charts, source management and even publishing your book!

## Double Header Night Hiring a Professional Genealogist & Family Atlas

DCAGS members were treated to a double header at the February 7 meeting. First up was Nancy Emmert. Her topic, "How to find and hire a professional genealogist."

Nancy is a long-time member of DCAGS and a Certified Genealogist by the Board for Certification of Genealogists and a member of the Association of Professional Genealogists.

She hit on a number of excellent tips. She started with a number of services

a professional genealogist can provide:

Tracing ancestry
Researching
descendants (from an Estate)
Researching records, such as going to a local courthouse
Problem solving consultation
Help write and edit manuscript
Deciphering old handwritten records
Translation

Nancy went on describe the research

activities of professional genealogists:

Define the research problem
Develop a research plan
Conduct the research
Analyze the findings
Prepare a research report with
documentation. It is very important to know what was searched, what was found, and what

#### Double Header continued...

Next up, Nancy explained how to hire a professional genealogist.

Identify your research problem
Determine your budget – know
what is charged for copies and
the per hour cost
Obtain a list of genealogists
Contact and interview
candidates, by phone or email
Decide who to hire
Have an agreement – what the
professional will do and how
many hours to work
Pay fees and provide information
to client
Stay in contact so everyone
knows what is being done

Nancy provided advice on how you can get the most value for your research dollars.

Gather as much information as you reasonably can Organize the information with pedigree charts, family groups sheets, copies of important documents

Don't withhold information, send copies of prior reports otherwise you may for things you already know.

Break large project into smaller tasks, pay as you go Agree on a maximum authorized amount or have written contact Ask for frequent reports.

Nancy then told where to find a professional genealogist.

Word of mouth, some news groups
Research lists provided by a library or archive
Association of Professional
Genealogists, members pay dues and sign a code of ethics,
www.apgen.org
Certified Genealogists, tested and renewed every five years,
www.bcgcertification.org
Accredited Genealogists, pass tests in their areas of specialty,

Nancy concluded by showing us an example of a report she prepared for a client.

Up for the second part of the double header was Joe Waddell. He demonstrated the program Family Atlas.

Joe has been researching genealogy for over 40 years and has been using computer genealogy programs for 26 years.

Family Atlas is genealogy mapping software made by RootsMagic. Joe sees the program as an adjunct to "Writing Your Family History" from the January program.

Family Atlas imports data directly from several genealogy programs:

Family Tree Maker, Legacy, PAF5, RootsMagic and GEDCOM files from other programs.

Joe then took us through a tutorial on the program. What the program does is pinpoint geographical sites world wide from your genealogical data. The tutorial showed how you could identify the birthplaces of your family members. The program allows you to choose shape, size, and color of markers. It allows you to label the points and select an event, like birth, death, marriage etc. It allows you to draw arrows or text bubbles to describe what is being shown. You can also add pictures. You can also import place markers by picking latitude or longitude.

The program then creates and prints these personalized maps. The maps can be saved and imported into genealogical programs which permit graphic images.

The cost of the program is \$29.95, plus \$5 shipping. The system requirements are:

The double header produced a big home run for members.

## Worldwide Genealogical Resources Now Available at the Wisconsin Historical Society

The largest genealogical collection in the world - the microfilm holdings of the Genealogical Society of Utah – is now available to Wisconsin family history researchers at the Wisconsin Historical Society.

In one place, the Historical Society now offers access not only to its own extensive genealogical holdings, but also the massive Utah collection and digital resources provided by the library edition of Ancestry.com. If the family history you always meant to begin never got off the ground because the prospect of traveling

to research far-flung, worldwide collections proved too daunting, then doing genealogical research just got a lot easier.

During the last 160 years, the Historical Society has built one of North America's premier genealogical collections. The library collection consists of: published and microfilmed family histories; church and cemetery records; birth, death and marriage registrations; federal and state censuses; local histories; and military information covering the United States and Canada. The Society's archives

also house original land, court and military records useful to researchers studying Wisconsin families. Now, researchers who visit the Historical Society library can also order microfilm from the vast collections of the Genealogical Society of Utah, the world's greatest collection of family history source materials. German church records, land records from Ireland, and military records from France as well as various records from Japan, India, Africa and other countries connect us to the experiences of our forefathers.
