What's New at the Family History Center at August 7 Meeting

What's new at the Family History Center? Our speaker will be Pam Anderson at the August 7 meeting of DCAGS. Pam will show some of the online genealogical resources one can use at the local Family History Center plus some athome resources available through FamilySearch in its various forms.

Online resources which were made available recently at the Family History Center in Madison include Footnote(TM), World Vital Records, Genline, and most Godfrey Memorial Library-provided databases.

Pam will show examples of looking up Swedish records in Genline and of doing searches in Footnote.

Many new resources are being prepared for public access at FamilySearch Labs; these resources are currently being offered to anyone (at home as well as at the FHC) on a "try it at your own risk" basis.

To whet your research appetite, Pam will show numerous examples of what you may find in these newlyavailable-on-the-Internetfree resources, including the 1930 Mexican census, Norwegian 1700-1900 baptisms, death records from Spain, World War II U.S. draft registration cards, and Philadelphia city 1803-1915 death certificates. If it is released before this meeting, she will also demonstrate the index to all

of the Irish civil registration of births, deaths, and marriages-over twenty-three million records spanning the years 1845 (marriage only) to 1958. She will show examples as well as some of the updated research outlines available on the "regular" FamilySearch.org.

Reminiscence Writing & Picnic

Reminiscence writing, within the grasp of anyone who has delved into family history, was powerfully demonstrated by six readers at our July picnic supper meeting at the Fitchburg Senior Center.

Guests who shared their stories had studied writing with Anne Short, now retired after a 21-year teaching career. In her introductions, Anne stressed the importance of recording stories gleaned from personal recollections or from relatives, to furnish real portraits beyond the vital statistics we strive to document.

Some of the accounts dealt fondly with a remembered grandparent

or other relative; One was a moving, respectful biography of a Middleton businessman composed by a "newcomer" who was disappointed that his mundane newspaper obituary captured so little of the man's life and character.

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Reminiscence Writing continued...

The subject of Rose Link's memoir was her father, whose post-retirement hobby as a beekeeper in Nebraska evolved into a business enterprise which he maintained until his death.

In "Coming to America," Eileen Kalscheur Aeschbach recounted family stories of their immigration from Austria. She was raised in Pine Bluff and has written eight books on the families in her genealogy. The books, which she brought along, contained stories, family trees, and pictures. Viewed afterwards, the books were impressive in their content; one took 12 years to prepare.

"A Belated Tribute to Arnie" was the contribution of Molly McDermott who lives in Middleton. She had wonderful stories about Arnold Schwartz, now deceased, co-owner of a former Middleton dry goods store, Schwab and Schwartz.

"Grandma Hattie - Room for One More" was a loving recollection by Loree Davis of her grandmother, who remained cheerful and welcoming despite a rugged life and the deaths of three husbands. In Hattie's home, there was always room for one more.

Ken Helgerson and his wife (a Kessenich), operate a B&B near Cross Plains. His delightful story, "A Colorful Couple," captured fond memories of his Aunt Idy and Uncle Gus.

Joan VandenHeuvel told the story about her "Mysterious Aunt Martha," who might be described as a "bag lady." Joan's memories of her late aunt were stirred by a television documentary on homelessness. Indeed, though Aunt Martha lived all her life in Hillsboro, her lack of conformity made a great impression on this writer.

Anne Short no longer teaches the class she started in September 1986 but says that she still gets together with many of her students to socialize and tell stories.

A storm swept through the area just before the picnic but about 60 people braved the bad weather to enjoy a meal of baked beans, franks, chicken, vegetarian pizza, potato salad, coleslaw and a variety of desserts.

Many people stopped on their way out to say how much they enjoyed both the meal and the wonderful stories.

Thank you, Anne Short and your pupils, and also applause for Joan Nagle, our program chairman.

Mirror, Mirror on the ... Web?

A searchable database of every issue of Madison Central High School's student newspaper, the *Madison Mirror*, spanning a period of more than 40 years, has been made available online by the Dane County Historical Society.

The project was introduced to the public at a DCHS program last month held at MATC downtown, site of old Central High. It was the culmination of a digitizing project started months ago under the guidance of Debbie Kmetz, Electronic Cataloging Project Coordinator. A complete collection of *Mirrors*, dated September 1925 through May 1969 when Central closed, was donated to the Society. It was printed in tabloid format, with issues appearing twice monthly.

Other digitizing objectives at the Society are complete records of the Madison Shriners' organization for much of the 20th century, and indexing of the "Know Your Madisonian" feature which appeared in the Wisconsin State Journal.

Names include prominent Madison men and women whose printed profiles, appearing 1956-1976, were illustrated with hand-sketched portraits by artist Edward S. Schumann.

Picnic Baked Bean Recipe

For those who asked for the "Picnic Baked Bean" recipe that was served at the July picnic, here it is. The original recipe came from the Betty Crocker 1961 version cook book and can be found on page 275. It was called Baked Bean and Sausage Casserole. It was an adaptation of the French "cassoulet" which included sausage, a second meat, beans, tomato and a variety of seasonings.

1 pkg. (10 oz.) frozen Lima beans or 1 drained can of Lima beans

3 cans (1 lb. each) baked beans (I like the molasses type)

2 cans (1 lb. 4 oz. each) kidney beans (drained)

1 lb. Italian link sausage or pork link sausage

1/2 lb. smoked ham, cut in cubes

1 tbsp. salt

1/2 tsp. pepper

1/2 tsp. mustard

1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce

1/2 cup catsup

1/4 cup brown sugar (packed)

1 medium onion, chopped

If you use the frozen lima beans cook per directions on pkgs. Otherwise mix all of the beans together. Place sausage in skillet: add a small amount of water. Cover and simmer 5 min. Drain: pan fry until brown. Don't prick. Cut each sausage into 2 or 3 pieces. Heat oven to 400 degrees. Mix sausage, ham and beans. Combine seasonings, tomato sauce, catsup, brown sugar and onion; add to beans. Pour into a 3-qt. baking dish. Bake uncovered 1 hr. Servings 10 -12.
