The World of Genealogy Webinars

A fairly new phenomenon in the world of genealogy, as well as many other areas of interest, is the webinar. A webinar is a web-based seminar--a presentation, lecture, workshop or seminar that is transmitted over the Web.

A "real" webinar is a live event which allows for some interaction between audience members and the presenter, even though they may be thousands of miles apart. Many webinars are recorded and can be played at a later time, although without the interactive elements. The presenters are often nationally-recognized experts in the topic. Some webinars are free to "attend," some have a nominal cost, a few may have a "serious" cost.

Live webinars have a limit on the number of participants and require advance registration, due to equipment limitations. We'll explore what one needs to view a webinar, how to find them, and look at the range of topics covered.

If at all possible, we will view a recorded webinar. A likely webinar for viewing at this meeting is Megan Smolenyak Smolenyak's "Reverse Genealogy: Finding the Living" presentation.

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"Getting the Most Out of an Obituary"



George shared that his talk is aimed at folks that are looking for recent obituaries. In most cases funeral homes keep them for 2 years and newspapers for 5 years. Type in the name of the newspaper and then the word obituary. If you don't know the name of the newspaper, type in the town and then newspaper to find options for you to search.

Obituaries cost money to have printed so some families don't post them. It also happens that sometimes family members don't exist or they don't want to write one for some reason. In genealogical research you must know your geography, at least for the area you're searching. Both funeral homes and newspapers generally give you the option of searching all of the obituaries they currently have available online.

First, once you find an obituary, capture it! Highlight the text and copy. Go into your genealogy software, locate the area where you can enter text specific to the individual and paste it in.

Second, capture your source and insert it into the correct field for sources in your genealogy software. Most genealogy software has auto fill so once you have

saved it you won't have to retype the entire entry again.

Continue to work your way through the obituary and create notes in your software for all of the relative information. The example George used was a statement that the deceased was divorced.

George had a situation that the SSDI gave one date and the cemetery had a day seven days later. The reason was that the cemetery (Catholic Church) records the date of burial. You can sometimes use text in obituaries to calculate/confirm dates based on information you have or that is presented.

For family members listed you should capture the information about them as well and place it in their records.

Examples of this would be if you did not have a date as to when this person died but the person was at a family member's funeral you could insert "After" the date noted in the relative's obituary. Another example would be where the family is currently living. This information will help you locate them when it's their turn to be researched/communicated with. To help you determine where information came from it's helpful to indicate "when her father died" or other such descriptors.

When the obituary lists a different spouse than what you have listed you should note this as well. George shared a helpful hint that all Maine Marriages are available on the internet from 1892 until 2009.






President's message
