Recap of "Genealogy from the Jewish Perspective"

Sue Goldstein showed a *PowerPoint* presentation on Jewish genealogy. Although some of the challenges faced in doing Jewish genealogy are the same as those faced by anyone looking for their ancestors, there are additional challenges. Name changes were common, like changing "Moshe" to "Max" or as Sue informed us her relative was born with one first name and buried with another first name. It was

thought that if a person was very ill and if you changed the person's name the angel of death could not find the person and the person would live. Several resources for locating Holocaust data bases were provided. The central Database of Shoah Victims' Names www.yadvashem.org/wps/portal/IY-Hon-Entramce or

http://db.yadvashem.org/names/search.html?language=en . The Bad Arolsen Archives mission is to document the fate of the victims. Note also that the Center will be closed for the Christmas holiday from 21^{st} of December through the 2^{nd} of January.







The Chicago Genealogist is a quarterly journal published continuously since 1969 by
the Chicago Genealogical Society or http://www.chicagogenealogy.org/

The easily searchable online collection is free to the public and contains volumes 1-39 (1969-2007). Although a useful listing of the contents of the quarterly is available on the society's website and it has been indexed in PERSI, this collection allows the researcher to search by keyword - a surname, church or school name, Chicago neighborhood, etc., in a way not possible previously. The collection is another valuable resource for the Chicago researcher's toolbox.

This cooperative effort is accessible through the CARLI (Consortium of Academic and Research Libraries in Illinois) Digital Collections site http://collections.carli.illinois.edu/index.php, where it is one of several collections of interest to genealogists.

All of the images in the Chicago Genealogist have been made available courtesy of the society and all rights are reserved by the Chicago Genealogical Society. Information about requesting reproductions is on the collection website. Newer issues are available through membership in the Chicago Genealogical Society. A complete print collection is available at the Newberry. Earth Point is a web site that offers a variety of mapping services, all of which will display map coordinates on Google Earth. Genealogists will be interested in the ability to

display townships and ranges on Google Earth.

The BLM Township, Range, and Section service displays townships, sections, and even quarter-quarter sections if you zoom in close enough (most, but not all areas have quarter-quarter sections mapped). It also calculates area, centroid, and corner points. You must zoom into the central or western United States to see the data.

NOTE:

States with complete BLM coverage:

Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Wyoming

States with limited BLM coverage:

Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, North Dakota (central and western portions are covered), Ohio, Oklahoma, South Dakota (western part is covered)

In addition, Earth Point can convert Township, Range, and Section into latitude and longitude or it can convert latitude and longitude into Township and Section.

Finally, if you have a long list of locations, Earth Point can import a

spreadsheet of lat/long coordinates to Google Earth. The conversion can even add pop-up balloons, icons, and paths directly from the spreadsheet data.

Earth Point provides some features free of charge but then requires payment for more sophisticated features. I found the list of what is free versus what is available only for payment to be rather confusing. The sites help files describe the differences this way:

A subscription is best for those utilities that display a grid on Google Earth, such as Township and Range, Texas Land Survey, and the Coordinate Grids. Without a subscription, these utilities display a pop-up message every ten minutes, asking you to purchase a subscription. After one day, the grid is deactivated, but continues to display pop-up messages. At this point, the user should remove the grid from Google Earth.

No subscription is needed for the one-time lookups, such as the Township and Range "Fly To" buttons, or the single Coordinate Conversions.




