A Double Feature by Walker Crawford and Rollie Littlewood highlights our October 4th meeting.

DCAGS is moving to a new website (http://dcags.camp8.org) that allows us to include an online membership management program accessible at anytime on the internet. Walker will walk you through this new product in advance of the official launching later this month as we begin 2013 membership renewals. This will allow (not require) members to manage their membership at their convenience. Members will have access to a members-only area (that will not be viewable to the public). This will add the ability for members to share more information about themselves, such as profile pictures and family tree documents. A current membership directory will be available, rather than relying on a paper version that outdates quickly. This product will also provide a venue for discussions on any topic members or visitors would like, including assistance on research.

Walker Crawford works for the University of Wisconsin Foundation supporting the development needs of the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He's been involved with genealogy since his great aunt turned over her 6,000 plus names from her research for computer entry when he was 21.

WorldCat is described as the world's largest library catalog; it is sometimes referred to as "OCLC." It is what virtually every Interlibrary Loan staff member uses to help you get books and other material from libraries other than your own. It contains information on MOST of the holdings of MOST of the major, and many of the not so major, libraries in the world. Rollie will show some of the features of WorldCat which you can use from your own computer. You can not only find where items you are interested in are held, but you can use it like any other online library catalog to discover related material.



Rollie is a retired academic staff member of the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Among other "vices", he spends at least one-half day a week working as a volunteer staff member in the Wisconsin Historical Society library archives.



http://www.fold3.com/title 761/war of 1812 pension files/. Last month 27,779 records were added. The total current amount is only 4% of all the records that need to be digitized.


Ancestry.com, FGS is helping to digitize

180,000 pension applications representing an estimated 7.2 million pages of War of 1812 Pension and Bounty Land Warrant Application Files. The collection will be available for **free** on fold3's website at http://www.fold3.com/title-761/war of-1812 pension files/. The War of 1812 pension files resulted from a man's service during the war, 1812-1815. Pensions were granted to the veteran, his widow, or his heirs.

The documents in this collection include full pension application files for soldiers and sailors who served in the War of 1812, as well as for their widows and children, or other heirs. The first applications were filed by servicemen who were disabled as a result of their service, or by widows who lost a husband in the war.

The descriptive pamphlet about the <u>Index to War of 1812</u>
<u>Pension Application Files</u>, M313, published by NARA,
provides a great deal of background and explanatory
information about the pension files and the acts that
provided for them.

CIVIL WAR ANTI-HERO

Not every family tale of the civil war is about a hero. My great grandfather Luke was born deaf, learned the three Rs in his years at the Kentucky School for the Deaf, but never learned to speak. Still he had a family and a small farm up in the hills where he raised turkeys, tobacco, and chicory.

On the morning of October 8, 1862 he climbed a steep hill so he could watch the Battle of Perryville going on down below. Odd but not rare, hundreds of people left Washington to watch the First Battle of Bull Run.

It was the bloodiest battle ever fought in Kentucky. Afterwards as Union corporals paced the battlefield looking for Southern sympathizers and deserters, they found Luke fast asleep under a tree and challenged his presence. He tried to say he lived nearby but his customary yowls convinced the men he might be a spy or escaping enemy.

Townspeople established his identity before nightfall and he was released but he resented the rough treatment he received and named his next son Jefferson Davis.

Some of the sources included are HeritageQuest, Ancestry, Fold3, as well as DAR, SAR, the British National Archives, and various state records.

Often you need to know the name of the commanding officer rather than the unit number to find records for both the Revolutionary War and the War of 1812.

Heritage Quest - Go to BadgerLink http://www.badgerlink.net/ Go to the far right, click on the library card access, enter your library and then your library card number, click on Heritage Quest. Heritage Quest has Revolutionary Pension and Land Bounty Warrants for soldiers and sailors who served at the Federal level. If your ancestors were serving in state militia they will not be here. The pension files are not all of the information but are limited to at most ten pages. If you find an ancestor in Heritage Quest you need to check both Ancestry.com and Fold3.com for additional records. Also use PERSI (periodical source index) and the serial series.




