Shirley York Anderson has been doing genealogy for 61 years. She started back in high school when her American History teacher assigned the class to create a three generation pedigree chart, which she still has. Her ancestors trace back to the Mayflower for both of her parents. She says that when her work on her ancestors stalls she works on her in-laws. Shirley has four children, six grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren. She worked for the State of Wisconsin for 24 years, retiring in 1992 to do genealogy full time.

She has written a book on The Descendants of Thomas York and Mary Dickens and has published it on a CD. She says that publishing it on paper would be too costly. 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### **Preparing for a Research Trip**



It is important to plan in advance for your visit. Some questions you should ask before visiting are:


- What are the hours that the repository is open?
- Are there any entrance fees?
- Are there restrictions for accessing materials?
- Are you limited to what you can bring into a research room?
- Is storage provided for materials you cannot bring in with you?
- Are there restaurants nearby for lunch/dinner breaks?
- Do you need to bring change for photocopy machines?
- Can you use your laptop in the research room?
- Is power available for your computer, or will you be running off your battery?
- Are iPods/mobile phones allowed?
- Can you bring in your own scanner?
- Is photography allowed? If so, are there restrictions on the use of flash?

The best place to find the rules is on the organization's website, but it is wise to either email or call to see if there have been any changes. Read Michael J. The two that I liked best were this one that suggested packing the following items:

- File folders (to organize photocopies and other papers)
- Multiple sets of rechargeable batteries (for camera, scanner, etc.; multiple sets allow you to use one while another is recharging)
- Pencils (because pens are barred from many repositories.)
- Erasers
- Paper clips
- · A magnifying glass
- Post-it Notes (of varying sizes)
- Binder Clips
- Small stapler and staples

The second one was to dress comfortably, but neatly, and to dress in layers. One never knows what the temperature will be in a repository. The more layers you have on, the more you can take off to keep yourself appropriately

"The <u>FamilySearch Blog</u> has a new article that states:

"Please note the following change in the policy for patrons who are

requesting copies from the Family History Library in Salt Lake City, Utah.


"All requests for information copied from films, book pages, CDs, marriage, death or birth certificates, wills and/or deeds, etc. will be copied in digital format and emailed to patrons in a zipped PDF or JPG file format. There is no charge for this service if we are able to email the information to patrons.

"If a patron does not have an email address, we can mail the information to the patron using the US Postal Service. However, as much as possible, we will rely on emailing all requests for information through the internet. If patrons do not own a computer or do not have an email address, they can request to have the information emailed to their local Family History Center, where they can print the information at the center."


# Need Naturalization Records? Then Check This Out.

While preparing for the upcoming class that I will be teaching in March, I stumbled upon new records posted on the FamilySearch site. On the bottom of the Home page where it says "Browse by Location", I chose the United States. It was there that I found a link to the Wisconsin, Dane County Naturalization Records, 1887-1945. The digital records were posted in January of 2012. You can browse the images, but note there is no online index. There is a list of where you

might find your ancestor within the record, but you need to do a page to page search. So I looked and found an old friend's record, that of Martin Martinson and his brother John, John had arrived in the USA in 1904 and Martin came in 1905. They were from Stange, Norway, and both applied for citizenship in December of 1909. At that time they were living in Windsor, Wisconsin. I then got curious and started looking on the Web to see what other information I



could find out about Martin. I found the "Illinois, Northern District Naturalization Index, 1840-1950," index and images, *FamilySearch* (<a href="https://familysearch.org/pal:/MM9.1.1/XKGN-YQ7">https://familysearch.org/pal:/MM9.1.1/XKGN-YQ7</a> ), Martin Martinson, 1913.



In the 1905 Farm Census I found Martin and John listed as servants on Edward Johnson's farm, Town of Vienna, Dane County, Wisconsin. John was 18 and Martin 17 at the time.



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The next record that I found was Martin's WWI draft card. By using Google and entering Martin's name, WWI, and DeForest Wisconsin, I found that Martin served in Company D, 332ND Machine Gun Battalion. This information was located on page 117of the PDF version of the Official History of the Eighty-Sixth Division <a href="http://archive.org/strem/officialhistoryo00littrich/officialhistoryo00littrich djvu.txt">http://archive.org/strem/officialhistoryo00littrich/officialhistoryo00littrich djvu.txt</a> (click on see other formats for PDF view)

On <u>People Search</u> Find relatives and locate ancestors <u>http://www.fags.org/people-search/martin-martinson/</u> I found Martin's date of death, October 1, 1986, place Stoughton, Wisconsin at the age of 97.

Now If I could only find naturalization records for my ancestors. If my eyes had been open I would have noticed that in September of 2012 the Wisconsin, County Naturalization Records, 1807-1992 images had been added. Use this link to read more about the collection and to access the records.

This time I clicked on Clark County and after checking the index, I located where the papers for my great uncle Bob could be found. Again I had to go page by page but it paid off for now I had the first naturalization papers for a family member. Uncle Bob (Barbaras) was 10 years younger than my grandfather and he came to the United States in 1902.

He and his wife, Tante Anna, farmed outside of Owen, Wisconsin. When we visited his farm as children, we were served ice cream which we

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ate with what we thought were Tante Anna's gold ice cream spoons. Now of course I know that they were made of brass, but as a child
