Focusing on the contributions of Wisconsin's soldiers and citizens during the Civil War, local actors and actresses don period dress, giving viewers a first person encounter through scripted vignettes. Empanadas

Recipe by Rosina

1/2 cup butter, softened 1 (3 ounce) package cream cheese

- 1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
- 1 cup fruit preserves
- 1/3 cup white sugar
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon



Directions:

DAY BEFORE: Cream butter and cream cheese together until smoothly blended. Beat in the flour. Shape dough into a smooth ball, wrap in foil or cling wrap, and refrigerate overnight or up to a week.

- 2. AT BAKING TIME: Remove dough from refrigerator 30 minutes before using. Start heating oven to 375 degrees F (190 degrees C).
- Roll chilled dough thin. Cut with 3 or 4 inch round cookie cutter. Place small spoonful of jam in center of each round, moisten edges with water.
- Fold round over and press edges together. Bake on ungreased cookie sheet 15 to 20 minutes. Immediately roll in sugar mixed with cinnamon.



Recap of August Program

Sherry Lloyd gave a presentation on the genealogy program *RootsMagic* at the July Dane County Area Genealogical Society meeting. *RootsMagic* allows you to keep track of your research, prepare reports, share your research online or create a book. Sherry believes *RootsMagic* is one of the easiest genealogy programs to use but one which also provides the genealogist with many tools to make record keeping easy and fun.

The software is available in two forms, the standard



package called *RootsMagic* and a free version called *RootsMagic Essentials*. Both forms are available from

http://www.RootsMagic.com.
The free version may be useful for people that want to encourage a relative to start genealogy or provide a way for you to share your research with family members that have not

used a genealogy program. You can easily transfer your research from *RootsMagic Essentials* to *RootsMagic* if you chose to purchase *RootsMagic* at a later time. *RootsMagic* costs \$29.95; it can be downloaded or ordered on a CD from RootsMagic is a *Windows* program, but can be run on a suitably-equipped Macintosh.

The tour of the software starts at the top tool bar and how to get your research into the software. The first tab "File" on the tool bar is the place to start. This is where the in's and the out's of the software reside, where you will enter your information into the database and get your information out.

To start, you open a database. *RootsMagic* will allow you to open two databases at the same time and open the same database twice. This will allow you to slide people from one screen to the other or to compare information in one database to another database. The software works with the GEDCOM tool as well as special tools for some common software. If you want to download a tree from Ancestry.com use the GEDCOM import tool. I recommend whenever you download information from the Internet make a new database so you do not mix up your research with the other person's information. You can then review the research before you add it to your database. The software will allow you to have many trees. If you do not know how a person is related you can enter the name and not link to your tree until you know the relationship.

The second row tool bar includes some of the frequently used tasks from the top tool bar. To enter a new person into the database go to the "Add" tab or click on the picture of the person on the second tool bar row. This is where you will start entering names, dates, and other facts. The software allows for many types of facts and you can make your own fact type. For example, if you want to keep track of all of the people that are descended from a Revolutionary patriot you can make a fact for that. Once you have a person entered

into the database you can edit the person's information by clicking on the name in the pedigree chart or go to the "Search" tab.

One of the best features of the software is the source wizard. When you add a source to your fact the software offers templates for several types of sources with hints on how to enter the information. You can also memorize a source and click on other people in the database to copy a source quickly. Sherry often copies text information from a test file directly into the source manager to save time. This is also a good way to reduce typing errors. For example, if you find an obituary in an online newspaper highlight the information and copy to a *Word* or text file then save to your computer; next open your database and click on the person you want to add the obituary source to and highlight the information in the *Word* file, press <Control/C>, then go to your database source detail tab and press <Control/V>.

The database offers different views: pedigree, family, or descendant views. You can search for a person by selecting events. You can color code the names in the database to help you keep track of family lines. You can set bookmarks to save your place, make groups, to-do lists, place lists can help you with spelling place names and even look at maps or check when a territory became a state.

One of the best features of *RootsMagic* is the *RootsMagic-To-Go* tool. You can click on the *RootsMagic To-Go* icon and the software and database transfer to a flash drive, so you can take your database with you without taking your own computer!

There are many charts and reports to choose from, or you can customize your own reports. You can even prepare a book with a few clicks of the keyboard. A recent feature is to work with FamilySearch Family Trees. You can, if you choose, link your database to FamilySearch and copy information back and forth. There are many extras with this software and very useful webinars to help you learn how to use the software.
