Is the topic of the June 5th DCAGS meeting at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, located at 4505 Regent Street, Madison, Wisconsin.

www.mille-soeren.dk Pat Skubis will update us on the expanding resources available on BadgerLink. How we can reach these resources easily and about the resources available to teach us how to get the most out of each site. Her presentation will also include links to foreign records, genealogy societies, and seldom thought-of records.

Pat (Bergstrom) Skubis, the current newsletter editor and a past president of DCAGS, became interested in genealogy when she was 30. At that time her aunt said: "I think your great-grandmother is buried in Red Wing, Minnesota." On her way back to Madison, she stopped to look for the grave but did not find it. She did find the Swedish Lutheran church, wrote to them and verified that yes her great grandparents had been members. It also helped that both her aunt on her



father's side and her mother had written down records going back to the greatgrandparents. It gave her a head start.

When she went back to school to obtain her BSN, she and her daughter spent many hours at the Wisconsin Historical Society looking for records needed to write her history term paper. Now 46 years later, she still has not found the grave, but she has over the years collected numerous records on her ancestors going back to the 1500s.

After retiring from a long career in nursing, Pat started teaching genealogy courses for MATC and Blackhawk Technical College. She recently has taught for the Community Education program in Oregon, Wisconsin.

To Pat, genealogy is a combination of a treasure hunt, a puzzle, and a good mystery. She enjoys filling in the holes. It is also the only way she likes to learn about history. Over the years she has received various articles and mementos from family members, but she says the best one came from her cousin Tom, who sent her a scrapbook that his mother had kept. In that scrapbook was the telegram that her grandmother had sent to her aunt announcing Pat's birth.

Worldwide Indexing Event

FamilySearch is hosting a Worldwide Indexing event with a goal of reaching 20,000 participants involved in one 24 hour period. The period is from Sunday July 20, 6 pm (MDT – Mountain Daylight Time) to Monday July 21, 6 pm (MDT). Participants will be encouraged to work on projects from their native language and world region but you do have the freedom to choose where you want to get involved.

FamilySearch has accomplished some impressive indexing goals. The whole of the US 1940 Census was indexed. Since then the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Community Project completed the indexing of over 75 million records.

The one billion record milestone was reached in March 2013. As of Tuesday May 20, 2014, a total of 1,162,470,188 records have been indexed. This is an impressive number that continues to grow. <u>https://FamilySearch.org/indexing</u>. 2014 has been designated as the Year of the Obituary and so far over 17 million names have been extracted and indexed from obituaries.

Don't wait to the last minute to get involved. Go to

https://FamilySearch.org/indexing and find a project that interests you and get involved. Do some practicing before the July 20, 2014 Indexing Event. There is a new indexing program coming soon with no software to download, you can index anytime you are connected and you will soon be able to index from your tablet.

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Recipe for June



Tangy Berries and Cream

Serves 4

Ingredients

1 cup plain yogurt

1/4 cup dark brown sugar, packed

3/4 cup whipping cream

1 teaspoon vanilla

1 1/2 cups fresh stawberries, slliced and divided

1 1/2 cups blueberries, washed, divided

Directions:

In small bowl, whisk together yogurt and brown sugar; Refrigerate. In chilled mixing bowl, beat whipping cream until it begins to thicken. Add vanilla and beat until stiff peaks form. Wisconsin Cheese Facts



Today, approximately 11,000 dairy farms, with over 1.27 million cows each producing an average of 21,436 pounds of milk per year, continue the reputation for quality milk from Wisconsin.

The History of Flag Day

On June 14th, 1885, <u>Bernard J. Cigrand</u>, a 19 year old teacher at Stony Hill School, placed a 10 inch, 38star flag in a bottle on his desk, then assigned essays on the flag and its significance. This observance, commemorated Congress's adoption of the Stars and Stripes as the flag of the United States on June 14,

1777. This observance was also the beginning of Cigrand's long years of fervent and devoted effort to bring about national recognition and observance of Flag Day. The crowning achievement of his life came at age fifty when President Wilson, on May 30, 1916, issued a proclamation calling for a nationwide observance of Flag Day. Then in 1949, President Truman signed an Act Of Congress designating the 14th day of June every year as National Flag Day. On June 14th, 2004, the 108th U.S. Congress voted unanimously on H.R. 662 that **Flag Day originated in Ozaukee County, Waubeka, Wisconsin.** http://www.nationalflagday.com/default.asp

12 Facts About the Flag and Flag Day

1. Flag Day is celebrated on June 14. It commemorates the adoption of the American flag by resolution of the Second Continental Congress in 1777.

2. The American flag, as we know it today, consists of 13 horizontal red and white stripes, each representing the 13 original colonies of the United States, and a blue rectangle in the canton with 50 white, five-pointed stars representing the 50 states of the Union

3. The 1777 resolution did not set the size or proportions of the flag, or even what shape the constellation of stars should be. As a result, flags of the era showed the constellation of stars in different arrangements, and flags were made with differing proportions. It was not until 1912 that the flag's design was standardized.

4. A **new star** is added with the inclusion of every new state to the Union. The number of stars increased to 15 in 1795, 20 by 1818, and the trend continued. The 50th star was added with the inclusion of the state of Hawaii to the Union in 1959.

5. Until 1818, a new stripe was also added for each new state. The famous Star-Spangled Banner that inspired our national anthem had 15 stars and 15 stripes.

6. The first flag was not made by Betsy Ross. We do know that Ross was a seamstress and that she probably *did* sew American flags; she just didn't create the first one.

7. The flag got its nickname, "Old Glory," from William Driver, a Massachusetts-born resident of Nashville, Tennessee who hid his homemade flag from Confederate troops, unfurling it again when the city came under the control of federal troops.

8. The Pledge of Allegiance was written not for Flag Day, but for Columbus Day.



9. Flag Day was founded by a school teacher named Bernard J. Cigrand, who began observing the day with his class at Stony Hill School in Waubeka, Wisconsin.

10. President Woodrow Wilson issued

a proclamation establishing June 14th as Flag Day on May 30, 1916.

11. In 1949, President Truman signed an Act Of Congress designating the 14th day of June every year as National Flag Day.

12. On June 14th, 2004, the 108th U.S. Congress voted unanimously on H.R. 662 that Flag Day originated in Ozaukee County, Waubeka, Wisconsin.

May Program


